Reviewing the Key Principles


- Deaths and serious injuries on our roads are preventable.
 - The only acceptable number of people killed is zero.
 - Safe systems: our roads should be "forgiving" of human error.
 - We may not be able to stop every crash, but we can make the consequences of those crashes less severe.
 - And we say "crash," not "accident."
- Engineering, enforcement, education.
- Defying the national trend with a 32 percent decline in all fatalities, and a 38 percent decline specifically in pedestrian fatalities since 2014.

THE RESULTS


Ongoing progress and improvement

- 32% reduction in NYC traffic fatalities between 2014–2018, versus 14% increase in United States
- Over 450,000 cycling trips per day, becoming safer as more people choose bikes; 134% growth in daily cycling between 2007 and 2017
- A win for sustainability: 2/3 of total travel by walk, bike, and public transit; lowest GHG emissions per capita in the nation
- International recognition for best practices
- Leading by example through knowledge sharing with peer cities

A multi-agency expert squad

- Regular meetings for knowledge sharing and strategizing
- Creating new initiatives
- Monitoring progress
- Flagging emerging issues

GETTING THE WORK DONE

DOT Engineering Under Vision Zero, 2014 - Present

- 461 unique safety engineering projects
- 82.6 miles of protected bike lanes
- Approximately 3000 new LPIs
- 560 miles of corridor retiming
- 340 left turn traffic calming installations
- 1900 new speed bumps
- 1100 locations receiving lighting enhancements


GETTING THE WORK DONE

Education and Enforcement

- Over 350 senior center visits
- Over 1500 schools visits
- Over 2 million flyers distributed
- More than 4 million automated enforcement tickets

SPEED MANAGEMENT

Possibly our most important tool

- 2014: Speed limit 25 on local streets
 - Small difference in speed = big change in stopping distance
 - Risk of pedestrian death halved
- Speed camera program
 - Speeding down 63% at locations with cameras
 - Hard-fought expansion: New law will make NYC's program one of the largest in the world

WHEN PROGRESS FALTERS

Responding to Crisis

- Expectation management
 - Progress not always linear
 - As total numbers decrease, departures look more drastic
 - BUT: Zero remains zero
- Deep dives into circumstances
- Advocate consultation
- Revisiting and revising strategies
 - What can we do on our own?
 - What requires new partnership work?
 - What can we do quickly, and what is longer-term strategy?

OVER-ARCHING PRINCIPLES

Strategies for Implementation Anywhere

- Eliminate agency silos
 - Incorporate every agency that has work related to engineering, enforcement, and education
 - Cast a wide net
- Follow the data
 - Review and revise
 - Make it relevant to your residents
- Strong leadership essential
 - What works isn't always popular
 - Commit to it
- Have reasonable expectations
 - Progress isn't always linear
 - Culture change is difficult and takes time
- Gather your advocates
 - Don't let your conflicts overshadow the fact that you have the same goal
