






Number of Serious Injuries 2009-2016

National Transportation Safety Board Study (2017)

- AASHTO Recommended Speed Range Local Urban Street (20-30 mph)
- Speed Limits are Effective at Controlling Driving Speeds (Goodwin 2015)
- FHWA Speed Limit Should be within 5 mph of 85th %
- Expert System (USLIMITS2) Road Character, Parking, Crashes



Boston Case Study


- In 2016, the Massachusetts state law was amended to allow lowering speed limits from 30 mph to 25 mph
- Effective January 9, 2017, the default speed limit on City of Boston streets was reduced from 30 mph to 25 mph
 - 25 mph signs were posted at gateways into the city or onto city-owned streets





Percent change in mean speeds and odds of vehicles exceeding 25, 30, or 35 mph

Relative to expected without speed limit reduction





New York State Law

- Vehicle and Traffic Law Section 1643 prohibits cities and villages from establishing area-wide speed limits below 30 miles per hour and also prohibits establishing any speed limit under 25 miles per hour on any roadway (except school zones).
- City of Ithaca passed resolution to contest this law
